ROARING INTO LINCOLN NEXT YEAR

MEET OUR NEW SUMATRAN TIGERS

When guests visit the new tiger habitat in 2019, they will meet two Sumatran male tigers—brothers—who will travel from San Diego Zoo to call Lincoln their new home. Their habitat will include hand-sculpted rockwork, a flowing stream and an interactive viewing area that brings guests up-close to one of the rarest and most endangered cats in the world.

The population of Sumatran tigers in the wild is estimated to be 500. With fewer than 90 in captivity, they are the most endangered tiger species in the world. The brothers are part of a worldwide conservation effort. "Saving animals from extinction has been at the forefront of our work for decades and the opportunity to take part in Sumatran tiger conservation is something that our Zoo and community will be proud to be part of," President & CEO John Chapo said. The brothers, aged 2 and a half and 2, come from

different litters but both were born in San Diego. The older brother suffered from kidney and urinary tract infections as a cub. To provide the medical attention he needed, he was hand-raised. In the wild, it is likely he would not have survived the infections. Once old enough the two cubs were introduced to each other to replicate what would have occurred in the wild.

The tigers will arrive in Lincoln in the Fall in advance of the expansion opening in 2019. The early arrival gives them time to explore their new home and give zookeepers an opportunity to get to know these animals.

Once guests meet the Sumatran tigers, they will notice that this species is a bit more active than others. They are one of the most successful predators of southeast Asia due to their size, speed and agility. The rock formations in their outdoor area provides enriching opportunities for them to leap and bound.

Their outdoor habitat was designed with enrichment and stimulation in mind but also gives the public an intimate look into the daily activities of tigers. "These are amazing animals that we hope our guests get a close look at and form a bond with. We hope to inspire guests to support conservation efforts to save them," Chapo said. "These tigers will further our mission of connecting people with critters and nature."

The Sumatran tiger habitat is made possible through the generosity of The Pearle Francis Finnigan Foundation with additional funding by the Jennifer & Justin Jones Family (Raising Cane's Franchisees) and Kawasaki Motors Manufacturing Corporation.





TRANSFORMING ANIMAL CARE

For 53 years, Lincoln Children's Zoo has been committed to bringing people and animals closer and leading conservation efforts to save endangered species. The expansion of the Zoo is an opportunity to further those efforts and make a global impact through research. Aside from building world-class animal habitats for giraffes, tigers, spider monkeys and red pandas, the Zoo also created the new position of director of medicine and conservation projects and hired Trent Schrader, DVM, to fill this role.

In his new position, Dr. Shrader will have three main areas of focus: veterinary care, welfare supervision and conservation research. He is utilizing his expertise in those areas to assist in the design and development of all the new and existing animal habitats in the Zoo. The tiger habitat includes areas for zookeepers and veterinary staff to get within a close but safe distance of the cats to monitor their health and behavior. Inside the spider monkey habitat will be a series of vines and ropes attached to structures, providing the monkeys stimulation designed specifically to encourage

natural behaviors that are important to their health.

"Whenever we create a habitat, the first thing we do is determine what is best for the animal. The mental and physical well-being of our animals is of the highest priority." Dr. Shrader said. The inclusion of Dr. Shrader in meetings with architects and builders ensures each area is designed for the specific needs of the animal that lives there.

The knowledge and expertise needed to advise the building of giraffe, tiger and spider monkey habitats isn't gained overnight. A graduate of Elmwood High School in Nebraska, Dr. Shrader attended Kansas State University with the intention of studying nutrition but ended up leaving Manhattan, Kansas with a Doctorate in Veterinary Medicine. He then went on to an internship with the University of Saskatchewan in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, Canada. It was here that he discovered his future was caring for animals living both in the wild and captivity. "In zoo medicine you perform a wide variety of work and part of that is conservation and research that may one day save an animal from extinction," Dr. Schrader said.

Dr. Shrader's conservation work focuses specifically on saving endangered animals. In the wild, male and female partners are often separated from each other due to deforestation, building of roads and various other reasons. To ensure these female animals are able to reproduce, Dr. Shrader freezes the reproductive cells of the male and then uses those cells to impregnate the separated female. This ensures that even though they were separated, these animals may have the opportunity to reproduce again, which makes the work of Dr. Shrader vital to the future of existence of endangered animals.

At Lincoln Children's Zoo Dr. Shrader's work goes far beyond caring for animals and helping design habitats. His research and conservation work is helping save animals from extinction all over the world. "We are not just expanding the Zoo for our guests or the benefit of our great community; we are expanding to make a difference here and across the globe. Our work is a valuable part of ensuring future generations have the opportunity to experience amazing animals and nature."

EXPANSION UPDATE


Progress on the Zoo's expansion is in full swing. Since the groundbreaking ceremony in April of last year, work has moved quickly with the opening of two new parking lots and the construction of the giraffe and tiger buildings as well as the Education and Conservation Center.


At the heart of the project is one of the premier giraffe habitats in the country. Standing nearly 28 feet tall, the building features a large indoor habitat, bedrooms for each giraffe and an indoor feeding area where guests will be able to feed them lettuce year-round.

Near the new main parking lot, guests can see walls for the Sumatran tiger habitat. The home for these endangered tigers includes rock and water features like those found in the wild. Next door to the tiger habitat is the new Zoo entrance and gift shop.

Initial work on the Education and Conservation Center has begun. This building will become the new home for the Zoo's current red pandas and provide space for Zoo Camps, education programs and Lincoln Public School's Zoo School program.
